The meeting was called to order at 8:32 a.m.

Introduction of Guests and Committee Members

Committee members and guests introduced themselves.

Approval of Minutes – September 8, 2022

Minutes from the September 8, 2022 meeting were reviewed. Andrews moved, second by Mangers, to approve the minutes as written. Motion carried.

OWI Treatment Court Updates, Data and Trends –

Rebecca Luczaj, Criminal Justice Collaborating Council (CJCC) Justice Services Coordinator and Honorable Judge Melvin Waukesha County treatment court programs began in 2006 for individuals charged with or convicted of 3rd and 4th operating while intoxicated (OWI) criminal offenses. Treatment courts are more cost effective than housing individuals in jails and provide clinical treatment, judicial supervision, drug testing and individual case management. The programs are funded by tax levy and program fees. Participants must be Waukesha County residents, be 18 years of age, be non-violent offenders and be considered high risk, high need. Participants also must be deemed drug/alcohol dependent as determined by a behavioral health screening tool, be initially screened/approved by the District Attorney's office and be screened/approved by a designated staffing team. Participants are provided with a staffing team which consists of a judge, prosecutor, defense attorney, case manager, Department of Corrections (DOC) probation agent and a Health and Human Services (HHS) substance abuse counselor. OWI treatment court consists of 5 phases: Clinical Stabilization (60 days), Acute Stabilization (60 days), Pro-Social Habilitation (60 days), Adaptive Habilitation (90 days) and Continuing Care (90 days). Participants are in the program for a minimum of 12 months however 4th time offenders will soon be required to remain in the program for a minimum of 14 months. Participants may also be required to attend a Victim Impact Panel. Victim Impact panels are held quarterly and will soon be available in Spanish.

- Discussion was held regarding setting an expectation for preferred providers to attend the provider forum in March.
- The county has created a Fentanyl tool kit titled "One Pill Can Kill" to raise awareness and educate Waukesha County residents about the dangers of Fentanyl. Alison will email the information to members.
- CleanSlate is not licensed under DHS-75 however, they are working on obtaining licensure. The Addiction Resource Council (ARC) will facilitate a memorandum of understanding (MOU) upon successful DHS-75 licensure by CleanSlate.
- Menefee reported that transportation within the county has become a huge need. It was suggested to fund transportation from the next opioid settlement cycle, potentially utilizing a peer support specialist as a driver.
- Yauchler reported that anyone coming into the jail on medication assisted treatment (MAT) will be able to continue MAT while in jail. In 2023, the jail will begin inducting individuals on MAT that come into the jail.

- The Community Health Improvement Plan and Process (CHIP) identified substance use among their focus areas in Waukesha County.
