The project was completed in 2010. The land has been determined to be excess right-of-way. The Department of Public Works (DPW) has received an offer of \$2,000 from the owner of the adjacent parcel. The net proceeds will be accounted for in the DPW – Transportation Fund. No additional funds are being appropriated with this ordinance.



MODIFY 2023-2027 CAPITAL PLAN AND 2023 CAPITAL BUDGET TO CREATE CAPITAL PROJECT 202316, MEDICAL EXAMINER'S OFFICE RENOVATION, FUNDED WITH AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT REVENUE

This ordinance modifies the 2023-2027 Capital Plan to create capital project #202316, Medical Examiner's Office Renovation, and increases the 2023 Capital Project budget by \$2,500,000 for this project. It is anticipated that the county will need to recruit for a forensic pathologist position in the near future, which will be a challenge due to a nationwide shortage in this field and the high workload for this position. One important factor in attracting qualified candidates will be the quality of the facility and work environment, and this renovation project is expected to help address deficiencies in the facility. This includes reconfiguring office space for a more efficient layout, replacing out-of-date furniture, and acquiring technology that is more in-line with industry standards.

During the budget and concept phase, the architectural design firm will conduct a review of other medical examiner offices in the region to develop design recommendations, factoring in a space use assessment and an inventory of technological features to enhance operational efficiency and help meet an increasing workload. Examples of possible technology enhancements include purchasing a computed tomography (CT) scan machine, which would provide more immediate scan results and eliminate the need to purchase third-party scanning services, and remote scene investigation capability to reduce travel, when appropriate.

This project would be funded with federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) grant revenues through the Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (CSLFRF) program, which provides funding to local governments to compensate them for revenue loss due to the COVID-19 pandemic, according to a formula developed by the U.S. Treasury. ARPA revenues claimed through this "revenue loss" category are eligible to pay for general government services, which include capital projects, such as this one.

The current proposed project budget is a preliminary estimate, and more refined cost estimates will be determined after the architectural design firm conducts their review of other facilities in the region and completes the budget and concept phase. If the projected costs exceed the budget, county administration may request a budget modification through an ordinance.

This project is not anticipated to result in a material ongoing tax levy impact. There will likely be annual software and maintenance costs associated with new technology, which may be offset by eliminating the need to purchase outside technology services.

Project Scope & Description

This project would renovate the Medical Examiner's Office to provide a more efficient layout for office operations, modernize the appearance, replace aging furniture, acquire industry-standard technology, and support future growth in operations. The budget and concept phase of this project will include a consultant review of other medical examiner facilities in the region to inform the design process.

This project is funded with federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) grant revenues through the Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (CSLFRF) program, which provides funding to local governments to compensate them for revenue loss due to the COVID-19 pandemic, according to a formula developed by the U.S. Treasury. ARPA revenues claimed through this "revenue loss" category are eligible to pay for general government services, which include capital projects, such as this one.

Both design and construction phases are budgeted in 2023 to provide flexibility to initiate construction before 2024, if the design and construction bidding process warrants it, and to utilize grant funds in advance of the grant deadline. Construction funds will not be spent until a standing committee of the County Board approves the project bid process.

Location: The Medical Examiner's Office, Law Enforcement Center, 515 W. Moreland Blvd, Waukesha, Wisconsin 53188

Analysis of Need

The Medical Examiner's Office was originally constructed in 1993 on the ground floor of the Law Enforcement Center building. The facility was later renovated in 2009 to expand cooler storage, autopsy, and tissue preparation area. This additional space was created by relocating office space to the floor above that previously served as bailiff roll call/locker room space. The project also replaced the existing garage with a new two-vehicle garage. Current Medical Examiner operations are split between two floors, with 7,188 square feet of space on the ground floor, including the autopsy room, tissue storage room, the freezer and coolers, the sallyport, and other space. On the first floor, there is 5,126 square feet for office space and a reception area.

Waukesha County will eventually need to recruit for a future pathologist vacancy, which is anticipated to be challenging because of a nationwide shortage of forensic pathologists due to fewer medical professionals entering this field. Additionally, there is a high workload, with 765 autopsies/external examinations during 2021, or about 383 per pathologist (compared to the industry of 250/pathologist annually). The county believes that an important factor in attracting qualified pathologist candidates will be facility quality and work environment. The current office space that was repurposed in 2009 was never adequately remodeled for its current purpose, lacks room for growth in medical staff, and includes outdated furniture. There is also underutilized space elsewhere in the facility. The county is also interested in upgrading and acquiring new technology that is in-line with industry standards.

Alternatives

- 1. Medical Examiner staff could continue to operate out of the existing facility as is, but the status quo could deter future pathologist candidates.
- 2. Just replace furniture and acquire new technology. While this would benefit operations, the inefficient layout and appearance would remain.

Ongoing Operating Costs

There will likely be annual software and maintenance costs associated with new technology, which may be offset by eliminating the need to purchase outside technology services. Reconfiguring the facility layout is expected to provide for more efficient office operations.

MODIFY THE MEDICAL EXAMINER'S OFFICE FEES AND MODIFY THE MEDICAL EXAMINER'S 2023 BUDGET FOR ADDITIONAL FEE REVENUE AND INCREASE OPERATING EXPENSES

This ordinance would authorize the Waukesha County Medical Examiner's Office to increase some of its fees to the amount permitted by state law to help cover increasing costs. State statute 59.365 limits the increase in medical examiner fees to the increase in the Consumer Price Index (all urban consumers, U.S. city average) for the 12 months ending on December 31 on the year before the increase. Each year, the County Board sets the Medical Examiner fee rates through the budget process (County Code Sec. 18-21). The 2023 budget, which was developed during June 2022, before final CPI numbers are known, conservatively assumed about a 5% increase in Medical Examiner fees. The latest figures from the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics show a 6.8% increase from November 30, 2022 compared to December 31, 2021. For demonstration purposes, the adjusted rates, assuming the allowable increase through November, are shown in the table below. The final December CPI will not be available until about mid-January, and this ordinance will be updated to reflect the final numbers for County Board Consideration prior to the County Board meeting.

If approved, the adjusted rate increase would go into effect on February 1, 2023 and is estimated to increase revenues (above the budgeted rates) on an annualized basis (February 2023-February 2024) by \$16,068. Due to the lag in CPI information and the February effective date, the partial-year impact in 2023 is estimated to increase revenues about \$11,316.

This ordinance also modifies the Medical Examiner's 2023 budget to increase operating expenses by \$11,316, funded with the higher fee revenues. The Medical Examiner's Office has been experiencing increased costs due to higher caseload and higher price levels. Due to supply chain issues, the department has been getting their medical supplies from vendors based on availability rather than based on price, which is how it was historically done. Third-party medical services costs have also been increasing. For example, the toxicology testing services provider has increased their fees about 6% from 2021 to 2022. Due to rising costs and an increase in caseload, the department has submitted either a funds transfer or an ordinance to request increasing their operating budget appropriation for the last 3 years (2020-2022). The 2023 adopted budget included an increase in operating expenses of about \$27,600 to help address increasing costs.

This ordinance authorizes the Waukesha County Department of Emergency Preparedness to accept grant funds administered through Wisconsin Emergency Management (WEM). The funding will be provided by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). The intent of this project is to promote the collaborative planning, emergency response, and the closure of capability gaps to minimize impacts during a real active-shooter incident.

This funding will be used for hiring a contractor to assist in the development and delivery of a full-scale exercise to test plans such as the fire departments' mass casualty plan, the County's Mass Fatality Plan, a communications plan, and the Family Assistance Center Plan. The exercise this grant would fund would incorporate Health and Human Services, the Sheriff's Department, several police and fire departments, school districts, hospital systems, and the American Red Cross.

This ordinance will increase the Department of Emergency Preparedness operating expense budget by \$17,065 and general government revenues by \$17,065.

This ordinance results in no additional direct levy impact.
