Annual Report of the Veterans Services Division

Roloff and Aldred presented on the Waukesha County Veterans Services 2023 Annual report. Highlights covered in the report include 2022 finances, veteran demographics identified by period of service and specifically Waukesha County veterans. The report also included statistics on the increasing average monthly contacts in 2022/2023, burial records project, and the assistance provided to those veterans that qualify for services under the Promise to Address Comprehensive Toxics (PACT). Finally, the presentation highlighted technological advances to improve customer service and outreach and community partnerships that are helping to expand their reach within the community.

Mental Health Center Suicide Prevention Update

Grzybowski and Aldred gave an update on the safety and suicide prevention measures in place at the Mental Health Center. On November 27, they will begin using ObservSMART technology, which is a compliance system utilizing Bluetooth technology to ensure patient observations occur on time, are documented and are done in close proximity to the patient. With ObservSMART, staff complete required safety rounds utilizing tablets that sync with tamper-resistant patient wearables. Other enhancements to the physical environment include crisis prevention intervention training for all staff and security, restraint chair, ligature proof blanket, safety furniture and break away doors, ligature proof sinks, toilets, ceilings, etc.

Embedded Mental Health Professional Program Update

Birdeau, Aldred and Faterioun gave a PowerPoint presentation on their handout titled HHS Crisis & Law Enforcement Collaboration: Embedded Positions. Highlights of the presentation included the makeup of the crisis team, a timeline of the creation of the program, various statistics showing the success of the program, information on partnerships with law enforcement.

Discuss and Consider Ordinance 178-O-072 Establish and Approve The Department of Health & Human Services 2023 Fees For The Regional Crisis Stabilization Facility

Aldred and Tranel presented that this ordinance establishes and approves the 2023 fees for the Waukesha County Health & Human Services Regional Crisis Stabilization Facility provided under DHS 34 Emergency Mental Health Service Programs and in accordance with Wisconsin Administrative Code Section DHS 1.03(2). The newly created HHS Regional Crisis Stabilization Facility is anticipated to open for business in December 2023 and requires a daily bed rate fee not contemplated in enrolled ordinance 177-O-093, which set the usual and customary fees for 2023.

Advisory and Standing Committee Reports

Gaughan reported that at the November 2 ADRC Advisory Board, Lisa Bittman gave information on the ongoing outreach with the Hispanic community. There have been many events over the past year, including collaboration with ProHealth.

A historical timeline of the evolution of the ADRC was given.

Gaughan reported that at the November 9 Public Health Advisory Committee meeting, Ben Jones provided an update on the Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP). The date has been extended from December to January for the CHIP action teams to complete their plan that will be presented to the steering committee.

Public Health has not heard back from the State regarding the 140 Review.

ProHealth will begin screening inpatients for Social Determinants of Health using the Unite Us platform.

Goldstone reported on the November 14 Substance Use Advisory Committee meeting. The committee suggested that the HHS Board recommend the County Board look into two ordinances:

- Restrict the sale of any Hemp product to anyone under the age of 21
- Make it illegal to sell synthetic urine

Aldred and Roberts will gather more information about these topics and will report back at the next HHS Board meeting.

Menefee had no update at this time for the Children and Family Services Advisory Committee (CAFSAC).

Menefee reported the next Interagency Program for Intoxicated Drivers (IPID) meets in December.

Goldstone reported on the November 13 Mental Health Advisory Committee (MHAC) meeting that the Salvation Army and Hebron House will need to make referrals for the use of the emergency overflow shelter. The shelter will have their own manager on staff.





Waukesha County Public Health Achieves Designation as a Level III Health Department

Recognition by the Wisconsin Department of Health Services Highlights Waukesha County's Commitment to Public Health Excellence

Waukesha County Public Health has been officially recognized by the Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) as a certified level III health department. This five-year certification signifies that Waukesha County meets the highest level of health department standards identified in state statute and administrative rules. Through this process, Waukesha County Public Health effectively demonstrated how it serves as the community health strategist and has taken a leadership role in the health issues facing the county.

The distinctions between Levels I, II, and III health departments in Wisconsin are clearly defined. At **Level I**, Local Health Department requirements focus on the public health core functions, the 10 Essential Public Health Services, national public health performance standards, and the Foundational Public Health Services model and are expected to align with current public health practices and state statutes. An annual report must be submitted to the Division of Public Health. Public health nursing services are intricately woven throughout Level I requirements.

Level II introduces everything from Level I and puts an emphasis on organizational performance through performance management and quality improvement, along with capacity building and workforce development, all while maintaining the integration of public health nursing services.

Level III, representing the highest tier, includes everything from Levels I & II, and entails a specific focus on community health strategy. A level III health department provides public health expertise, data, and research to the community; and a focus on impacting population health. Additionally, Level III mandates an environmental health program, with a community and systems focus. Public health nursing services continue to be an integral component across all levels, ensuring a consistent emphasis on nursing expertise within the broader scope of public health services.

Future Review Date

Local health department level designations are in force up to five years. The date of the determination letter is used as the start of that five-year period. Waukesha County Public Health's next DHS 140 review would need to be during or before calendar year 2028.
