

Work Force Challenges

CAFSAC members working on these solutions:

- Job Fair for just non-profits

- Collective training model partnership among agencies

- A ripple effect from lack of providers in one area can affect other areas within the community
- Shortage of qualified people and significant problems during the interview process
- Lack of staff capacity to help support graduate student interns and there is not financial compensation for the students
- Problems with retaining staff taking positions outside of human service fields
- Need to recruit outside of Waukesha County because of expensive living or lack of housing in Waukesha County
- Not enough transportation options for workers to get to work

Mental Health Issues

Importance of Prevention and Early Intervention

- Agencies have waitlists for services (child, adult, family) -can't hire providers as indicated on previous slide (ripple effect)
- Very little culturally specific, LGBTQ+, trauma specific, male providers any marginalized groups having difficulty finding providers that meet their needs
- Higher number of mental illness indicators correlate with more complex child protective cases 55% of open Ongoing CPS cases involving mental health issues in July 2022 (Waukesha DHHS staff presentation at CAFSAC mtg)
- Data from Waukesha Co YRBS- 2021 high school
 > 1 in 7 students (15%) have seriously considered suicide
 > 2 out of 3 female students reported problems with anxiety
 > 62% of LGBTQ+ students reported problems with depression
- Mental Health Providers 1:390 for Waukesha County (County Health Rankings & Roadmaps 2022)
- Affects the homeless population who struggle in shelters or become transient

Substance Abuse Issues

High School Students and Families

* CHIPP priority *

Importance of Prevention and Early Intervention High school students are struggling with substance use issues

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 > 23% of students currently use alcohol

 > 25% report they have tried vaping

 > 17% have tried marijuana

 (Waukesha Co YRBS- 2021 high school)

- Caregivers are also struggling with substance abuse issues

 Higher number of substance abuse indicators correlate
 with more complex child protective cases

 > 63% of open Ongoing CPS cases reporting
 substances abuse issues in July 2022 (Waukesha
 DHHS staff presentation at CAFSAC mtg)
- Can be a factor when students are truant caregivers unable to get them to school

Benefits of **Prevention and Early** Intervention

Continue to fund Birth to 3 programs

- Multi-faceted due to long terms costs mental health, physical health, criminal justice, education, economy, housing, workforce
- Services/supports for caregivers children learn from their family increase protective capacities and skills
- 2022 California study (Economics and Child Abuse) return on investment > For every \$1 spent on early intervention /prevention = \$2.92 to \$16.84 savings

Out-of-Home Care Shortages

Create a Professional Foster Parent (PFP) demonstration project

Create pilot intensive residential care (IRC) facilities

[Both endorsed by WI County Human Service Association]

- Children with complex behaviors require higher levels of care with caregivers who have the skills to manage the child's behavior
- Shortage of foster placements that provide intensive residential care services for children with problem behaviors resulting in children being placed out-of-state
- Foster parents get paid when they have a child in care, not for the time they put into becoming trained and maintain the professional skills needed to care for children with complex
- Lack of available respite care for foster parents

Flexible Funding

Creating opportunities and provide financial support for agencies to expand, continue, or implement programming that meets the qualification standards for FFPSA.

FAMILY FIRST PREVENTION SERVICES ACT (FFPSA)

- Allows States to use Title IV-E fund for prevention services
- Goal is to keep children safely at home and out of foster
- Maximum of 12 months of services
- Services can include in-home parent, skill-based programs, such as parenting skills training, parent education and individual and family counseling
- Program must be evidence-based curriculum and have components of trauma informed care

Affordable Housing / Homelessness

Work with apartment developers to build homes that can be used

Provide assistance to families in order to prevent housing instability / homelessness

- Waitlist for housing vouchers / subsidized housing ➤ Landlords not willing to take vouchers
- Many families are at risk of losing housing causes great instability in families
- % of students are homeless directly impacts their ability to succeed in school
- On the night of January 26, 2022 there were 151 homeless individuals in Waukesha County

 > 90 single persons
 > 61 people in 17 families
 > 4 youth who were also parents
- In the 2018/2019 school year Waukesha County had 395 students who met the federal definition of homeless. In comparison, Ozaukee had 42 and Washington had 158. $\,$ In the 2019/2020 there were 350 $\,$
- Affordable Housing Single income earners who are below fed poverty level (but were at the top dollar amount) fair market rent for a 2 bedroom is over 98% of income earned (or more than the income earned). Additionally, it would be over 56% of income for a single parent of 2 children.

Be an Advocate for healthy children and families in Waukesha County.

Support funding for:

- ✓ Mental Health and Substance Misuse services for youth and families
- $\checkmark\,$ Support for early intervention programs such as Birth to 3
- ✓ Advocate for additional placement resources for youth
- √ Flexible funding to preserve and stabilize families including assistance to prevent homelessness
- Agencies to create and sustain programming that meets FFPSA standards

Prevention and Early Intervention are needed at all levels.

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
