# History of the Waukesha County Drug Treatment Court

The Waukesha County Drug Treatment Court is one of 50 Drug Treatment Courts in Wisconsin, implemented in 2012. The program is based on the national drug treatment court model which has 10 key components that Wisconsin Community Services, Inc. (WCS) integrates and follows. The drug court model has been around since 1989 when the first drug court was established in Miami-Dade County, Florida. As of November 2016, there were 3,057 active drug courts in the US.



The WCS Waukesha County Drug Treatment Court staff consists of three full-time employees, one supervisor, two case managers, and a part-time Recovery Coach. Staff are members of the NADCP (National Association of Drug Court Professionals) and attend national and local trainings on an annual basis, in line with best practice standards. Planning for this program began in 2011 and participants started enrolling in March 2012. Since the inception of the program, there have been 74 graduates through December 2016 and there were 34 graduates in 2016.

### What is the Drug Treatment Court?

The Waukesha County Drug Treatment Court offers participants the opportunity to break the cycle of addiction, improve the chances of a sober, crime free, and healthy life and contribute to a safe community.

### **How Do I Qualify to Participate?**

- 18 years of age or older
- Waukesha County resident
- Must be pending non-violent felony charges or misdemeanor habitual offender
- No prior violent felony convictions
- Willing to address substance abuse/dependence

### What does the Path to Success Look Like?

You have the opportunity to:

- Increase your chances of living a healthy, crime free and sober life
- Heal relationships with family and friends
- Spend less time in jail
- Receive ongoing, individual support
- Experience freedom from drug dependence
- Amend current charges to a lesser charge

### **How Long Does it Take?**

The length of the program is determined by each participant's progress through the four phases. Graduation may occur within one year, but it is likely to take additional time beyond that depending on the participant's treatment needs.

### **How Does the Program Work?**

- Assessment: Potential participants must meet with WCS to complete the RANT and the Texas Christian University Drug Screen.
- Admission: Takes place at court, after the Deferred Prosecution
   Agreement is executed.
- Court Appearances: The Judge will actively monitor your case through regular court appearances.
- Treatment and Support: Ongoing, individualized treatment is required in addition to self-help group attendance.
- Incentives and Sanctions:
  Rewards are given for positive
  behavior and sanctions are
  imposed for inappropriate
  behavior.
- Case Management: Your Case Manager will provide support and monitoring to assist you in reaching your goals.
- Program components may include: Random drug and alcohol testing, referrals to community resources, and home visits.
