IPID COMMITTEE MEETING SEPTEMBER 8, 2016 MINUTES

The meeting was called to order at 8:34 a.m.

INTRODUCTION OF GUESTS AND COMMITTEE MEMBERS

Committee members and guests introduced themselves.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Minutes from the June 9, 2016 meeting were reviewed. O'Brien moved, second by Wipfli to approve the minutes as written. Motion carried.

DEMONSTRATION OF INTERLOCK IGNITION DEVICE (IID)

Amy Cry and Heather Stapula from Smart Start provided the committee with an ignition interlock device (IID) education seminar. Cry reported the interlock system is similar to the breathalyzer that the police use. She explained how the IID works when an individual is required to use it in their vehicle. The driver blows into the hand-held portion where the data is analyzed, recorded and stored. Wisconsin interlock requirements include a 1-year minimum, all violations must be sent to the local sheriff's department and, installation and removal notifications must be sent to the DMV and the local sheriff's department. Discussion was held regarding the process of transferring the system to a newly purchased vehicle while the IID requirement is still in effect. Eiring stated the owner has 15 days to transfer the system to the newly purchase vehicle.

Cry explained the additional features that are utilized in Wisconsin which are dual heaters, online data reviews and summary reports. Device features that are used in other states include detachable heads, cameras and a cellular modem. The detachable head allows for ease of re-calibration. The camera allows for driver identification and daily PBT's. The cellular modem provides violation alerts and allows real time violation reports. It can also record GPS (location and speed).

Cry explained myths and facts associated with the IDD:

- An offender is not required to test while driving. The individual has 5 minutes to safely pull over and take the test however, the test can be taken while driving.
- Upon fail of the test, the car will not completely turn off. The horn and lights will pulse until the car is physically turned off.
- The device will not drain the car battery. The device uses about the same amount of battery that it takes to preset your radio stations.
- The device is not hard to use but it is tamper resistant.

Other devices offered by Smart Start include IN-HOM, a portable device and IN-HOME SMART, a mobile device. Coming soon is a fingerprint drug test that will provide positive identification of the individual and sweat analysis indicating the presence of drugs in the body.

REVIEW PROVISIONAL PROVIDER STATUS OF SERENITY RECOVERY CLINIC

Luznicky updated the committee on Serenity Recovery Clinic. Updates to clinic brochures and the website are underway. Luznicky reported that the clinic is now listed on the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) treatment provider locator list. An additional clinic has been opened in New London, Wisconsin. The New London clinic provides services for Rawhide and Waupaca County Alcohol court. Plans for the Greenfield office is continued expansion. Luznicky anticipates hiring additional staff at both locations. An overview of the services provided include assessments, individual therapy and treatment plans, treatment of co-occurring disorders, relapse prevention, group and individual therapy sessions and OWI homicide groups. The clinic however, does not offer mental health services but refers those individuals to other providers.

The committee discussed accepting Luznicky as a longer term full-time provider. Although his clinic is small, it is growing. He is certified and he has a plan for services in place. Members were impressed with Luznicky's willingness to work with new students wishing to pursue a career in the field.

The committee unanimously approved Serenity Recovery Clinic as a full-time status provider for driver's safety plans for Waukesha County.

CHAIR REPORT

Kettler began by reporting the Comprehensive and Addiction Recovery Act passed.

Due to scheduling conflicts, Dr. Nancy Healy-Haney has appointed Arlene White to fill her position on the IPID committee. White is a nurse from Public Health and will continue to provide medical aspect to the committee. She will begin attending meetings in December.

Kettler reported that the state released a tool from IDP best practices workgroup. It is a self-assessment tool that Manger had a part in developing.

The IDP prevention workgroup released statistics regarding poverty rates, compliance and population within certain counties. Kettler will forward the information to anyone who wishes to look at it.

The AODA volunteers of Waukesha County are having a panel presentation on September 22nd from 12-1 p.m. in room 114 at HHS. They will be discussing their history, mission, recovery and how people can get involved.

The Addiction Resource Council (ARC) will be holding a Fund Racer on September 23rd from 5-9 p.m. at Veloce Indoor Speedway. The event includes discounts on racing, recovery speakers, food and raffles.

Future topics

- Occupational driver's license (eligibility, process, etc.)
- Research other companies that offer ignition interlock devices
