This commendation is based on the officer's work on the Smith Homicide Case from the City of Oconomowoc. The case would not have been solved without their efforts and the City of Oconomowoc Detectives diligence and hard work. They showed extraordinary teamwork, they were organized and their dedication and commitment to get the case resolved was outstanding.

Detective Wepfer was the case officer responsible for reading and coordinating the volumes of information that was coming in, not only to put it together for the DA's Office, but also to ensure that all of the leads were being followed up on. His exhaustive investigative efforts were invaluable to solving this crime. He also went to California and Mexico to follow leads that ultimately led to the arrest of not only the person who committed the murder, but also the two subjects responsible for hiring the person who committed the homicide.

Detectives Mudlitz, Toole, Hecht, Grall, Herrmann, Tesch, Voss and Lieutenant Deering were all part of this very complicated investigation. They followed numerous leads, collected evidence, traced wire transfers, talked to hundreds of people that potentially had information and several traveled from Texas to California to Mexico. When a citizen calls the Sheriff's Department for emergency assistance or to report a crime, chances are their first contact will be with a Deputy Sheriff assigned to the Patrol Division. Deputies assigned to the Patrol Division are typically the first responders to an emergency event.

When not on assignment, their activity can range from interacting with citizens to prevent crime, working roadways to ensure the safety of the motoring public, or working to identify potential criminal activity. Their primary objective is to provide a safe and secure environment for residents, businesses and visitors to Waukesha County.

***Patrol Division (cont.)***

To ensure efficient utilization of resources, coverage is divided into primary patrol districts with deputies working out of the main office at the Justice Center in Waukesha, as well as substations and contract communities in the primary coverage areas. Coverage includes I-94 and I-43. Coverage is also provided to contract service areas including the Town and Village of Merton, Village of Sussex, Town of Delafield, Town of Waukesha, Town of Lisbon and most recently the City of Pewaukee.

In 2010, the Patrol Division had 104,133 calls for service, which generated 6,131 incident reports and resulted in the issuance of 7,186 traffic and county ordinance violation citations. Of the 7,186 citation 391 were for Operating Under the Influence of Intoxicants / Prohibited Alcohol Concentration arrest of that 26 were issued for Operating Under the Influence of Intoxicants / Prohibited Alcohol Concentration arrest for causing injury, deputies also wrote 2,225 accident reports of which 11 were fatal accidents.

Additional duties of patrol include the responsibility of transporting prisoners between various state and county correctional and mental health facilities and our jail and/or courts.

Residents of Waukesha County benefit greatly from the high quality of services that the Department workforce is able to provide 24 hours a day 7 days per week service. Additional Patrol Division activity includes the encouragement of community involvement, direct service enforcement initiatives, dedicated and specialized law enforcement services and specialized training. Specialized units include: Motorcycle Patrol, Snowmobile Patrol, Boat Patrol, Canine Support, Search and Recovery Dive Team, Tactical Enforcement Unit (TEU), Crisis and Hostage Negotiators, DARE officer, School Resource Officers and a team of Accident Reconstructionists and Crisis Intervention Team.

In addition to routine enforcement efforts, the Patrol Division participated in a number of specialized enforcement initiatives related to drunk driving, seatbelt enforcement, truck enforcement and school safety studies along with other traffic mitigation activity funded through a variety of state and federal grants. These initiatives are intended to further enhance public safety on Waukesha County roadways.



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## Waukesha County Sheriff's Office

### *Contract Services*

The Waukesha County Sheriff's Department has a long tradition of providing law enforcement, emergency communications, and police transcription reporting services on a contracted basis to communities within Waukesha County. Communities utilizing these services have found that law enforcement and related services result in a lower per capita cost for law enforcement service to the taxpayer. Law enforcement service contracts are in effect for the Town of Delafield, Town of Merton, Village of Merton, Village of Sussex, Town of Waukesha, and Town of Lisbon.

Most contract areas have recently signed a five-year extension for contracted law enforcement service. Contracts allow for local control as a municipality can design a custom tailored approach for the delivery of law enforcement services. These tailored contracts offer many benefits. Here is a sampling of those benefits:

- **Local Control** - Municipalities elect the level of police service they want to receive. They can have a strong voice in selecting personnel. A municipality can set the direction and priorities for their community. The municipality determines the level of coverage they are to receive.
- **Experience** - Experts in the law enforcement profession are immediately available to assist and support local communities electing to contract for law enforcement service.
- **Local Identity** - Municipalities can elect to have distinct vehicle markings that present the appearance of having their own police department.
- **Economy of Scale** - Contracting provides communities with support services that may not be immediately available to a community starting a new police department and are available only through a large law enforcement organization. These services includes administrative services, 24 hour supervision, technology, computer crime specialists working to combat Internet fraud and child pornography, highly trained investigators and evidence specialists, accident reconstruction, youth and school liaison officers, tactical officers for crisis events, canine search teams, investigators, and community policing specialists which all stand behind the officers assigned to contract communities.
- **Reputation** - The Sheriff's Department is a proven leader and the largest law enforcement agency in Waukesha County. The Department has earned its reputation as leader and innovator in the law enforcement profession.

The Sheriff's Department is dedicated to providing responsive customer, oriented service to the contract and unincorporated areas of Waukesha County.

*Village of Sussex Contract*



The Waukesha County Sheriff's Department has a long tradition of providing law enforcement services on a contracted basis to communities within Waukesha County. The Village of Sussex has contracted with the Waukesha County Sheriff's Department for dedicated law enforcement service since 1973. In 2010, the village contracted for 11.3 full time employees (FTE) to be assigned to their contract. Two deputies are assigned to each of the three shifts. Additionally, a Lieutenant serves as the village's Director of Police Services. The Village of Sussex is committed to community oriented policing and remains a leader in the region in promoting shared police services.

***Village of Sussex (cont.)***

In October 2009, the Village of Sussex in partnership with Waukesha County, completed construction of the Public Safety Building. The new facility is located on Main Street and was an addition to the existing Sussex Fire Department building. It serves as the cornerstone of an effort by Waukesha County and the Village of Sussex to promote regional cooperation between communities for law enforcement services. The Village of Sussex Public Safety Building is used as the primary station for the deputies and detectives assigned to the Village of Sussex, Town of Lisbon and Village of Merton law enforcement contracts.

In 2010, the deputies assigned to the Village of Sussex responded to 3,991 calls for service. In addition, deputies participated in 273 community policing events. Examples of community policing contracts include, the village ice cream social, national night out, theme based day camps for kids, community movie night, Sounds of Sussex in the Park, school functions, educational seminars, golf outings, events sponsored by the recreation department, and activities promoted by the senior center. The deputies assigned to the village of Sussex contract are encouraged to form positive relationships with residents and business owners through daily interaction during the course of their duties.

The Village of Sussex remains committed to improving the quality of life for its residents through its contract with the sheriff's department.

*Town of Delafield Contract*



In 1991, the Town of Delafield contracted with the Waukesha County Sheriff's Department for dedicated law enforcement services with eight hours of service seven days a week. Town of Delafield Deputies not only are they involved in the enforcement of state statutes and local ordinances, they also are involved in other community events.

In 2009, the Town of Delafield requested to reduce the hours of service and went to one eight hour a week service. In 2010, deputies responded to 119 calls for service from domestic disputes, to vehicle lockouts and issued 244 citations along with 128 business and house checks while traveling 4,271 miles in the town ship.

***Village of Merton Contract***

The Waukesha County Sheriff's Department is able to provide dedicated law enforcement services to communities that desire partial shift coverage. The Village of Merton has contracted with the Waukesha County Sheriff's Department for dedicated law enforcement service since 1998. The Village of Merton contracts for dedicated service 5 days a week during the 2:45 pm-11:00 pm shift. The Village played a significant role in the selection of the deputy from the Sheriff's staff that would provide law enforcement service to their community.

In October 2009 the Village of Merton, in partnership with Waukesha County, the Village of Sussex, and the Town of Lisbon formed a regional public safety building that the deputies from the respective contract districts and detectives from the Sheriff's Department would operate out of. This regional station enhanced the level of service to the communities by increasing the quality of the communication between the deputies on patrol and the detectives that investigate crimes. The regional public safety building also stands as a commitment on behalf of the Village of Merton to the idea of shared services between neighboring communities.

In 2010, the deputy assigned to the Village of Merton responded to 291 calls for service. In addition, the deputy participated in 24 community events. A few examples of community events would include national night out, theme based day camps for kids, school events, educational seminars, and events sponsored by the recreation department. The deputies assigned to the Village of Merton contract are encouraged to form positive relationships with residents and business owners through daily interaction during the course of their duties.

The Village of Merton remains committed to community orientated policing and they consider it a priority as part of everyday patrol. In 2010, the deputy assigned to the Village of Merton logged over 136 hours of bicycle patrol, interacting with citizens and business owners in the community.

The Town of Merton is located in the northwest part of Waukesha County consisting of the uniquely different communities of North Lake, Stone Bank, Monches, Village of Hartland, Village of Chenequa and the Village of Merton along with a number of lakes located through out the town ship. In 1993, the Town of Merton contracted with the Waukesha County Sheriff's Department for dedicated law enforcement with eight hours of service seven days a week. The deputies assigned to the Town of Merton are not only involved in the enforcement of state statutes and local ordinances, but they are also involved in many community events. Stone Bank Fireman Festival, Stone Bank Lion Days which hosts one of the biggest 4th of July parades in Waukesha County. In 2010, deputies responded to 611 calls for service from domestic disputes, to vehicle lockouts. Deputies patrolled and logged 28,583 miles while conducting 2,999 business and house checks.

The Town of Waukesha is located in south-central Waukesha County, as of the 2010 census the town has grown to a population of 8,933 with 3,023 residences. In 2004 the Town of Waukesha contracted with the Waukesha County Sheriff's Department for dedicated law enforcement service that would serve the citizens of the Town of Waukesha with eight hours of service seven days a week.

In 2010, Town of Waukesha deputies responded to 924 calls for service to assist and enforce the state statutes and local ordinances, from domestic disputes, to vehicle lockouts. Deputies also logged and patrolled 26,181 miles in the township and assisted in 9 community service programs.

*Town of Lisbon Contract*



In 2008, the Town of Lisbon contracted with the Waukesha County Sheriff's Department for dedicated law enforcement services. The hours of operation are 7:00 am to 3:00 pm, and 3:00 pm to 11:00 pm.

Town of Lisbon Deputies not only are involved in the enforcement of state statutes and local ordinances, but they are also involved in many community events. One such event is the annual bicycle rodeo that is held each May at the Holy Redeemer Church in the Town of Lisbon. Children learn how to wear safety equipment and also learn how to follow traffic rules concerning bicycles.

A new neighborhood speed enforcement initiative called; "Keep kids alive, drive 25" was adopted by Lisbon Deputies. This initiative attempts to keep kids safe in their neighborhoods by having motorists slow down and drive 25 mph on neighborhood streets.

Town of Lisbon Deputies answered 2212 calls for service in 2010, from domestic disputes, to vehicle lockouts. Deputies logged 61,362 miles and were involved in 809 community service events during the same period.



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## Waukesha County Sheriff's Office *City of Pewaukee Contract*

In 2010, the Waukesha County Sheriff's Departments became the first sheriff's department in the State of Wisconsin to enter into a contract agreement to provide full-time law enforcement services to a city. The City of Pewaukee is approximately 21.8 square miles. The I-94 corridor runs through the southern part of the city and, with that, comes increased daily population for both business and recreation. Three deputies are assigned to day shift, three deputies assigned to afternoon shift, and two deputies assigned to night shift. There is also a deputy working 6 pm to 2 am 5 days a week, a detective assigned to day shift 5 days a week, a lieutenant assigned to day shift 5 days a week, and a lieutenant assigned to afternoon shift 5 days a week. In 2010, deputies assigned to the city responded to 7,430 calls for service, investigated 420 motor vehicle accidents, served 123 civil process and issued 4,970 citation. 185 of the citations were issued for local ordinance violations.

The City of Pewaukee conducted survey of resident's satisfaction with city services. The citizens gave an 83.3% satisfaction rating, the highest rating given to any city department, to the services provided by the Waukesha County Sheriff's Department.

The Sheriff's Department continued to provide the Community Programs important to the citizens and city council members. Cops & Bobbers, Badges & Bull's-eyes, and Gutter Busters programs were conducted on several dates throughout the year. Cops & Bobbers was conducted on 10 days during 2010. One hundred fifty eight area children were able to go fishing with deputies, share a light lunch, and learn about the environment. Badges & Bull's-eyes was held three times in 2010. Twenty-four children were able to learn to shoot a bow, learn basic safety skills, and spend time with deputies during lunch. Gutter Busters was held on 3 occasions. Forty-nine children were able to spend time with deputies bowling in a fun, relaxing environment, discuss child safety issues, and enjoy lunch with the deputies.

For the first time, the Waukesha County Sheriff's Department conducted National Night Out for the citizens of the City of Pewaukee. Deputies and several vehicles from the department's specialty units were on display at Wagner Park. The displays included the Mobile Command Post, the Dive Team Equipment Truck, a K9 handler and his partner, the Tactical Enforcement Unit's Armored Vehicle, a member of the Motorcycle Unit, and a Patrol squad. The City of Pewaukee Fire Department participated, as well, and displayed a fire truck, ambulance, and their Command Vehicle. The City of Pewaukee Park & Recreation Department also participated to provide activities for kids and a dinner.



## Waukesha County Sheriff's Office *City of Pewaukee Contract (cont.)*

The Waukesha County Sheriff's Department conducted Spring Truck Weight Enforcement for the first time for the City of Pewaukee. This enforcement provides protection for the streets of Pewaukee during a time when the roads are most vulnerable to damage due to roads thawing after the winter freeze. By enforcing weight limits, damage to the streets is reduced and costly repairs and re-pavement of the City's roadways is minimized.

The Waukesha County Sheriff's Department works in cooperation with the City of Pewaukee Municipal Court and the City's attorneys to handle security matters and coordinate the court process on days when court is in sessions. Municipal Court is usually in session two times per month. On average over one hundred and fifty people appear in front of the judge each session.

Deputy Robert Faith, who is assigned to Day Shift in the City of Pewaukee, was selected as the Optimists Club 2010 Deputy of the Year for his work for, and dedication to, the City of Pewaukee Contract. Deputy Faith worked extensively with the community programs, including both Cops & Bobbers and Badges & Bull's-eyes. He was also very active in education and enforcement of traffic laws in the City as well as the Spring Truck Weight Enforcement project. Deputy Faith responded to hundreds of calls for service in a very professional manner for the citizens of the City of Pewaukee. Deputy Faith demonstrates great initiative in many areas of law enforcement that led to the success of the City of Pewaukee contract.

The Deputies of the Waukesha County Sheriff's Department are committed to providing the citizens of the City of Pewaukee a safe, secure environment to live and raise their children.

In 2010, the Detective Bureau conducted follow-up investigation on approximately 1,753 case assignments. They assisted in checking 497 individuals who are wearing electronic monitoring devices to ensure they are complying with their court ordered conditions. They conducted 95 premise checks for the alcohol procurement program and checked local establishments for violations of selling to individuals that are not old enough to purchase alcohol. The Public Assistance Fraud Detective investigated 26 cases throughout the County and the Background Detective completed 383 investigations. The Internet Predator Group continues to monitor the Internet and has done an outstanding job educating kids and their parents on how to stay safe.



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## Waukesha County Sheriff's Office *Computer Forensics Unit*

The Waukesha County Sheriff's Department's Computer Forensics Unit continues to evolve into one of the premier Computer Forensic Units in Southeastern Wisconsin. The unit was developed by the Sheriff's Department as a response to the significant increases in computer crime. The Unit's objective is to positively impact online victimization through sophisticated technological investigative activity as well as develop evidence from computers that may have been involved in the commission of a crime. Assigned detectives have been recognized by their peers as very knowledgeable and well-respected computer forensics investigators. Currently there are two detectives assigned and both are also assigned to the Federal Bureau of Investigation Milwaukee Cybercrimes Task Force. We have been extremely appreciative of donations that have helped us with equipment needs in the Unit. Since its inception, the Computer Forensics Unit has also provided assistance to the following law enforcement agencies:

The Waukesha County Sheriff's Department is the lead agency for the Waukesha County Metropolitan Drug Enforcement Unit. This cooperative effort had a significant year in 2010 seizing large amounts of marijuana, MDMA, and diverted pharmaceuticals.

Waukesha County is facing the largest drug threat in the form of the illegal distribution and use of diverted pharmaceuticals often used in combination with heroin. The Unit supported several Len Bias type homicide investigations, focusing on persons that supplied drugs used in fatal overdoses.

The Metro Drug Unit also supports the community by partnering with Drug Free Communities, the Juvenile 180 Diversion Program, and responding to requests for presentations and educational forums related to illegal narcotics activity. The Unit Commander is President of the Wisconsin Narcotics Officers Association, a 400 member statewide organization that has both community and legislative activity in relation to suppressing the illegal drug trade.

The Court Services Division has two primary responsibilities: providing security for the Waukesha County Government Center, and serving legal documents related to civil, criminal, and family court proceedings.

By state statute, it is incumbent upon the sheriff of the county to ensure that certain legal documents, (known as “civil process”) be served. There were 5,496 civil process papers served by the sheriff’s department in 2010. There has also been an over 100% increase in the number of sheriff foreclosure sales conducted by the department.

In addition, the sheriff is responsible for providing security for the Waukesha County Courthouse. This is accomplished by providing uniformed, armed sheriff’s deputies, to serve as bailiffs for 12 circuit courts and 5 county court commissioners. The bailiffs assigned to this service completed a total of 17,858 hours of bailiff duty during the year of 2010.

The Court Services Division also has one deputy assigned to the service of warrants issued by the Circuit Courts. This deputy works with clerical staff, the courts, district attorney’s office, and other law enforcement agencies to make sure that all the warrants coming from the courts are served in a timely fashion.

The Waukesha County Government Center includes the Administration Center, Children’s Center, Health and Human Services Facility, Mental Health Facility, Public Health Building, Waukesha County Jail, and the Waukesha County Airport. Deputies from the Court Services Division perform random patrols and respond to duress, door, and fire alarms that occur in these facilities. They assist with fire and tornado drills, and other matters of emergency preparedness.

The Court Services deputies also handle a variety of other situations, arising in and around these facilities. These deputies assist in training and the implementation of various security programs that are developed by Waukesha County. This includes an ongoing program of general security training and emergency response, which is taught to nearly all Waukesha County employees.

The Waukesha County Sheriff's Department is an active partner, working with the Department of Administration and Circuit Court Divisions, in the development and enhancement of security practices and procedures for Waukesha County. In addition, the Court Services Division Commander participates on the Judiciary Security Committee, the Waukesha County Facilities and Security Commission, the Waukesha County Business Continuity Committee, and various emergency planning groups. The Sheriff's Department also coordinates programming for special security measures, such as the security screening program, (in the courthouse complex) and the after-hours security team for other county facilities.

### *Motor Unit*

The Waukesha County Sheriff's Department recreated the Motorcycle Unit in 1994. Although we did have motorcycles in the early years of the department, this was the official formation of a dedicated unit. We began with one Harley Davidson motorcycle and it has now grown to four motorcycles with four deputy sheriff's assigned. The motorcycles are used for daily patrol, special enforcement details, law enforcement escorts and dignitary protection.

Each year the motor unit provides escorted rides for various community groups, this last year we had approximately 31 escorted rides. Most of these groups are raising money for very worthwhile causes; such as funds for the children of fallen officers, Make a Wish, supporting veterans and cancer research.

The motorcycles are utilized seven days a week on dayshift and our afternoon shift. When winter arrives, the bikes of are stored for the season.

Even though we have the changing climate in Wisconsin, the unit averages approximately 33,000 miles a year.

The Waukesha Sheriff's Department realizes the benefits of the motor unit, including responding to areas not accessible by a squad car and the tremendous savings in fuel costs. The deputies assigned to the unit enjoy the flexibility that motorcycles bring to any law enforcement situation. The public has given us positive feedback on how the bikes keep the deputies accessible and in touch with the citizens of our communities.

### *Canine Support Unit*

The Waukesha County Sheriff's Department Canine Unit was established in 1990. Since then the department had 16 canines. The canine's abilities include: locating lost persons, school searches, tracking, apprehension, evidence search, narcotics detection, building searches, and officer protection.

The mission of the Canine Unit is: *To provide extensively trained, highly motivated and dedicated canine teams to respond to critical incidents, In any community, whenever requested to protect the citizens of Waukesha County.*

The Department makes Canine Support available to any law enforcement agency upon request. The canine teams have assisted numerous agencies including the United States Marshal's Service; Milwaukee High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area; United States Secret Service; Dubuque, Iowa; along with numerous law enforcement agencies throughout Southeastern Wisconsin.

The Canine Unit is available 24 hours a day to respond for duty. In 2010 the unit had 600+ calls for service. Each year the canine unit assists 17 different school districts in Southeastern Wisconsin. The handlers and canines are also members of the Waukesha County Sheriff's Department's Tactical Enforcement Unit, they respond to high-risk calls, hostage situations, armed barricaded subjects, drug warrants, robberies, burglaries, and vehicle pursuits.

The handlers and their canines are certified through the North American Police Work Dog Association and are members of the Wisconsin Law Enforcement Canine Handlers' Association.

Each handler is assigned a squad car that they take home at the end of their shift this allows for better response times to calls when they are requested off-duty. The canines go home with the handlers at the end of their shifts, are a part of their families and socialize with the family members. When the canines retire from active duty they are signed-over to the handlers and remain at the handlers residence from then on.

Currently there are four dual purpose Belgian Malinois canine teams working for the department. All four teams are certified through the North American Police Work Dog Association in Patrol, Narcotic Detection, Evidence Detection, Tracking, Building Searches, Crowd Control, and Handler Protection.

Deputy Chris Deakin has been a deputy for twenty-four years and a canine handler for seventeen years. Canine “Bronco” is Deputy Deakin's third canine partner and began his service with the department in May 2008.



# *School Resource Officer Program*

The School Resource Officer (SRO) program is a problem-oriented policing approach to reducing crime. Specially trained officers are assigned to each of the traditional high schools in the Hartland-Arrowhead, Sussex-Hamilton and Kettle Moraine School districts. The purpose is to establish an on-going rapport with students, staff and parents. In 2009, the Department entered into a contractual agreement for an SRO at Norris School

By training law enforcement to educate, counsel, and protect our school communities, the men and women of Waukesha County Sheriff's Department continue to lead by example to promote a positive image of law enforcement to our youth. Our officers have made themselves available to communities and school districts around the county in the development of effective school- based law enforcement partnerships.


The program began in 2000 and is the result of a partnership between Waukesha County Sheriff and the Hartland-Arrowhead and Sussex-Hamilton School Districts. The program has three basic goals:

- To provide a safe learning environment and prevent incidents of school violence.
- To improve school/ law enforcement collaboration with the emphasis on the student.
- To improve perceptions and relationships between students, staff, and law enforcement officials.

The Waukesha Sheriff's Department has four SRO's covering three public high schools and one private high school. Their primary duty is to prevent crime in the schools. The Tactical Enforcement Unit and the SRO's have developed a "Fast Response Team" approach for any action that may take place at the schools. SROs often find themselves instructing students on such subjects as' substance abuse, driving under the influence, campus violence, talking with students, and making referrals to other agencies to help solve individual student and/or family problems. Besides working with individual students, SROs are committed to the community policing concepts regarding their schools and surrounding neighborhoods. Officers have successfully worked on traffic issues, noise and litter complaints, drug sales, and safety on school property as well in nearby parks and business areas. Most investigations can be resolved by establishing partnerships with students, staff, parents and other members of the community. The School Resource Officer provides safety and education to a community of students within our communities.

***D.A.R.E.***  
***Drug Abuse Resistance Education***

The primary goal of the D.A.R.E. program is to significantly reduce the use of alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs as well as the use of violent behavior by young people. The Waukesha County Sheriff's Department is an active participant in this program. Similar to our School Resource Officer initiative, the D.A.R.E. program is a problem solving, community oriented policing program at the grade school level based upon law enforcement interaction with students. It provides students with the opportunity to perceive and interact with deputies as a "coach" and not through enforcement activity. Beyond substance abuse education, D.A.R.E. helps law enforcement keep the lines of communication open with not only students, but educators and parents as well.

The D.A.R.E. concept has changed radically from its original program. D.A.R.E. is going high-tech, interactive, and places significant emphasis upon decision making. D.A.R.E. utilizes the latest in prevention science and teaching techniques. D.A.R.E. is re-inventing itself as part of a major national research study that promises to help teachers and administrators cope with ever evolving federal prevention program requirements.

Part of the reason D.A.R.E. works is because it is a collaborative effort between your Sheriff's Department and schools. D.A.R.E. nationwide provides students with the support and skills necessary to make informed decisions regarding substance abuse. D.A.R.E. has had the highest dissemination for any school-based drug prevention program. D.A.R.E. reaches approximately 36 million children a year in approximately 80 percent of all school districts and is supported by parents and school administrators alike.

In 2004 the Waukesha County Sheriff's Department introduced the new ten week D.A.R.E. program by contracted service to the Waukesha County School Communities. The contract program gave the school communities the ability to design a custom approach toward their D.A.R.E. program.

One deputy served as a D.A.R.E. Instructor during 2010 school year for seven school districts serving approximately 450 students.

### *Boat Patrol*

The Waukesha County Sheriff Department provides boat patrol on area lakes during the boating season. The patrol that is currently provided by the department is staffed by deputies trained by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources in current boating regulations. The goal of the boat patrol is to ensure all citizens can enjoy the lakes and waterways of Waukesha County safely, with respect to others use of the same waterways.

The Waukesha County Sheriff's Department has provided summer boat patrol on county lakes for decades. The Department mainly patrols county lakes that are larger and busier such as: Okauchee Lake, Pewaukee Lake, Lake Nagawicka, Lake Lac La Belle, and Lake Keesus. Over the past five years the Sheriff's Department has dedicated an average of 261 lake patrol hours with over 200 of those hours on the water and the other hours fulfilling administrative responsibilities.

### *Winter Patrol*

The Sheriff's Department patrols area snowmobile trails and lakes during the winter recreational season. Snowmobile and all-terrain vehicle patrol assignments are offered to deputies that have proven proficiency on the equipment in addition to receiving specialized training in the statutory aspects of the operation, licensing, and registration of these vehicles. These deputies have also attended training in the State snowmobile and all terrain vehicle laws provided by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources.

Over the past five years the Sheriff's Department has provided an average of 48 hours of winter snowmobile patrol with approximately 27 of those hours on the snow. The other hours are for program administration, transport time and maintenance of the equipment. It should be noted that the number of hours of winter patrol provided are dictated by the weather, ice thickness and the amount of snow.

**Waukesha County has successfully received between 70% to 100% reimbursement for expenses incurred for winter patrol activities from the State of Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources.**

*Traffic Accident Reconstruction Unit*

The members of the Accident Reconstruction Unit respond to accidents that have resulted in fatalities, serious injuries or substantial financial loss. The Reconstruction Unit uses scientific instruments to measure the crash scene. These measurements are later used to create a scale diagram of the crash scene. This diagram depicts the location of vehicles and evidence of the crash.

The Reconstruction Unit continues its investigation by using numerous mathematical equations to determine the speeds of the vehicles involved in the crash. The Reconstruction Unit gathers additional information by conducting post-crash vehicle inspections, downloading airbag modules, and interviewing witnesses. All of the information is then used to determine precisely how the crash occurred and whether any human, vehicle, or weather factors played a role. A report is then forwarded to the District Attorney's Office to assist in any criminal charges.

*Under Water Search and Recovery*

The Waukesha County Sheriff's Dive Team's primary mission is recovery of evidence and drowning victims from lakes, rivers and quarries in Waukesha County. The Dive Team also provides assistance to area Fire Departments in water rescue operations. Other operations have included bottom surveys of ponds, quarries and lakes, assisting with water quality sampling, and investigation of hazardous materials in area lakes. Captain Jeff Smidt is the Commander of the Dive team. The team consists of seven divers and two surface support personnel.

All Sheriff's Department divers are trained to the **Professional Association of Diving Instructors (P.A.D.I.)** Master Diver certification level. All divers have completed certification training in specialties such as Rescue Diver, Deep Diving, Ice Diving, Wreck Diving, Search and Recovery, Night Diving, Underwater Navigation, Equipment Specialist and Underwater Archeology. The divers maintain their proficiency by training every month in all weather conditions. The Dive Team deploys approximately 20 times per year.

### *Chaplains*

The Waukesha County Sheriff's Department have chaplains to support and assist the Department when dealing with difficult and stressful circumstances.

Taking time from their active ministries, they are available 24 hours a day to help not only department personnel and their families with personal issues, but they are also here to comfort, guide and assist our citizen population in their time of need. They support our staff by helping to make a death notification, or being with a family at victim identification, or to offer solace and aid at the scene of a crisis. The Department recognizes what a great help these fine ministers can be.

### *Crisis Intervention Team*

The Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) is comprised of volunteer deputy sheriffs with specialized training in how to work with the mentally ill. These deputies attend a 40-hour training course. The course covers suicide assessment, dealing with excited delirium and the principles of de-escalation when working with someone in crisis. There is a full day dedicated to scenario-based training involving actors in typical situations that deputies respond to where mental illness is a factor.

CIT trained deputies help to reduce the likelihood of physical confrontations, there by reducing the risk of injury to all people involved. It also seeks to utilize community resources, family, and friends of the individual with a mental health concern.

The emphasis of the CIT program is to encourage the mental health individual to choose voluntary treatment as opposed to facing involuntary commitment. The Waukesha County Sheriff's Department currently has 13 CIT trained deputies.

***Tactical Enforcement Unit (TEU)***

The Sheriff's Department maintains a Tactical Enforcement unit to support and assist law enforcement personnel throughout the county in the resolution of high risk and dangerous incidents. The primary purpose of the Department's Tactical Enforcement Unit includes, but is not limited to:

- *Protecting lives and property.*
- *Enhancing the prospects of resolving dangerous incidents peacefully.*
- *Neutralization of dangerous events.*
- *Introducing tactics and strategies in the field that promote containment and stabilization of incidents involving the threat of death or great bodily harm.*

The Tactical Enforcement Unit is also used for executing high-risk search warrants and making arrests where it is known that a suspect may represent a threat to the community or officers. The Tactical Enforcement Unit has also provided escorts for dangerous prisoners and can serve in dignitary protection security details.

An assignment to the Tactical Enforcement Unit is voluntary and in addition to other normal duties. Well trained, equipped and operationally innovative, the Tactical Unit consists of thirty (30) deputies and officers from three law enforcement agencies who are trained to employ a wide variety of specialized weapons, equipment and tactics including several "Less-Than-Lethal" means of subduing resistive subjects. The deputy inspector serves as commander, one captain serves as assistant commander, one lieutenant serves as operations coordinator, two lieutenants and two sergeants serve as in-the-field supervisors. The Crisis/Hostage Negotiations Unit consists of a captain, one lieutenant six (6) negotiators. All of the members are highly trained in communication, investigation and conflict resolution skills. The negotiator team's contribution to conflict resolution is to establish and maintain dialogue with resistive subjects with the goal of bringing a "High Risk" incident to a successful conclusion without injury or loss of life. The Tactical Enforcement Unit also has the volunteer services of an ER/Trauma Doctor who serves as Tactical Medical Specialists to provide medical support.

The Waukesha County Sheriff's Department has earned a statewide reputation of being one of the finest and most skilled and proficient tactical units in Wisconsin. The Department continues to host basic and advanced tactical and sniper schools and provides other related specialized training.

In 2007 the Tactical Enforcement Unit completed reorganization of the unit to incorporate municipal officers from two other departments into the team. The reorganization was a response to make more efficient use of tactical resources throughout the county. The Tactical Enforcement Units that merged with the Sheriff's Department were the Village of Menomonee Falls Police Department and the City of Oconomowoc Police Department. The Tactical Enforcement Unit also remains committed to maintaining the readiness to respond to school and workplace violence incidents, violent crimes in progress and serving "High Risk Warrants".

# Citizens Academy

The Waukesha County Sheriff's Department opened its first Citizen's Academy on October 11, 1995 with 17 students graduating 6 weeks later. Given the profound interest that citizens have in the functions of a law enforcement agency, the Sheriff's Department has continued the Citizen Academy. Currently we run two 11 week academies, one in the spring of the year and one in the fall. The sessions are held on Tuesday or Wednesday evenings from 6:30 - 9:30 pm. The academy is designed to provide citizens with a first hand look at the role of a modern law enforcement agency. More importantly, the program provides insight into how citizens can become active participants in preventing crime.

The Waukesha County Sheriff's Department Honor Guard was established in February 2001 for the purpose of honoring officers who have fallen in the line of duty, and representing the department as ambassadors at various events and ceremonies, including department and community functions. The Honor Guard is committed to providing the highest level of dignity to ceremonial functions while serving as official representatives of the department. The Honor Guard promotes honor, professionalism, and integrity through its conduct and upholds the department's core values to the highest degree.

Some of the functions at which the Honor Guard serves include funerals of both active and retired Waukesha County Sheriff's Department members and funerals of officers from other departments, including county and state officials. The Honor Guard participates in department events such as recruit graduation ceremonies, memorial services, community events such as parades. The Honor Guard also serves at ceremonies for visiting dignitaries and other requests made by the public that are authorized by the Sheriff or the Sheriff's designate.

The Honor Guard currently has twelve members consisting of a Unit Commander, a Lieutenant, and deputies. In 2010 the Honor Guard participated in thirty-eight events including training. All of the Honor Guard members received training from the Washington DC Metropolitan Police Ceremonial Honor Guard Unit.

### Explorer Program

The Explorer Program originated with the Boy Scouts of America to teach young adults job skills and hands on experience in various career fields. The mission of the Explorer Program is to allow participants to gain exposure to criminal justice careers by interaction with law enforcement professionals, receiving career focused training, and obtaining hands on experience and awareness of the criminal justice system.

In keeping with the mission and goals set forth in the Learning for Life Exploring Program, the Waukesha County Sheriff's Department trains and provides guidance in various areas of law enforcement. This is accomplished through class room instruction, hands on training, Explorer competitions and participating in an on-the-job ride-along. Some of the training includes AED/CPR, arrest tactics, firearms skills and interpersonal relationship skills. Through these learning experiences, the Explorers learn not only what will help them as they progress toward law enforcement careers, they also learn leadership, responsibility, honor and pride. Being an Explorer provides scholarship opportunities toward college education, and the chance to attend State Explorer academies and apply to attend FBI, DEA, US Marshal or the US Secret Service academies.

In order to take part in the Explorer Program, an individual must be at least 14 years of age (or to have completed the 8<sup>th</sup> grade) and under 21 years old. In addition, the Waukesha County Sheriff's Department requires the explorers to submit to criminal and traffic background checks along with fingerprinting. Explorers must also maintain a 2.0 grade point average and be willing to make a commitment to assist in at least three Waukesha County Sheriff's Department sponsored events throughout the year such as Make-a-Wish, Waukesha County Fair, and Shop with a Sheriff, as well as participating in one Police Explorer competition.







As the chart below indicates, the Sheriff Department's main revenue source is Waukesha County property tax levy which comprises approximately 70.5% of the Department's revenue. The remaining 29.5% is mainly funded by:

- Charges for Service Revenue (21.1%): Municipal patrol contract revenue, federal inmate board, and Huber board

- Other Revenue/Fund Balance (3.9%): Commissary revenue and inmate phone revenue

In spring 2007, Sheriff Trawicki closed an operational floor at the Huber Facility and placed Huber inmates onto an electronic monitoring program. Closing the floor allowed the Sheriff to transfer eight correctional officer positions back to the county jail to address staff shortages.

Eligibility for the electronic monitoring program is conducted by jail staff using a risk assessment created by staff which takes into account community safety, liability and releasing sufficient numbers to maintain the closure of an operational floor.
