

## OPEN MEETING MINUTES

### Waukesha County Human Services Center IPID Committee Meeting September 12, 2019

The meeting was called to order at 8:32 a.m.

#### **Introduction of Guests and Committee Members**

Committee members and guests introduced themselves.

#### **Approval of Minutes – June 13, 2019**

Minutes from the June 13, 2019 meeting were reviewed. Sternweis moved, second by O'Brien, to approve the minutes as written. Motion carried.

#### **Statewide Initiatives, Innovative Ordinances and Pilot Study on Place of Last Drink – Julia Sherman, Coordinator, Wisconsin Alcohol Policy Project**

Sherman presented a PowerPoint on Place of Last Drink (POLD); when an individual arrested for OWI/DUI is asked to name the last location that served them alcohol or, place of last drink. POLD is used to prevent impaired driving by using the gathered data to indicate what places may be over-serving (problem locations). Over-serving does not only impair driving, but it also impairs thought process at home (domestic violence, vandalism, assaults, etc.).

Many states are currently using POLD and enforcing consequences on establishments that are identified. Consequences include, alcohol license suspension, unannounced visits by state agents, training for owners/servers, and sanctions against the establishment if no progress is made to clear up the over-serving issue.

Wisconsin has been collecting POLD data for 20+ years but has not used the data until a pilot project began in the City of Waukesha in 2015. The data is collected by law enforcement on the Alcohol/Drug Influence Report (SP4005). The goal is to identify if one location is consistently over-serving so an investigation into that location can be justified. Data collected in the first 6 months led to the Sober Server Ordinance in the City of Waukesha.

After the POLD data is collected, local police meet with the location owner and provide them with a printout of the information. The printout does not include patron names. In some instances, police give the owner 2-3 weeks to come up with a plan to reduce over-serving. Owners may check to see if certain employees are over-serving and some even re-think their drink specials. In most cases, owners are compliant and eager to rectify the problem. Statistics have shown that when licensees are confronted, over-serving goes down.
