The meeting was called to order at 8:35 a.m.

Introduction of Guests and Committee Members

Committee members and guests introduced themselves.

Approval of Minutes – March 10, 2022

Minutes from the March 10, 2022 meeting were reviewed. Andrews moved, second by Mangers, to approve the minutes as written. Motion carried.

Application for Driver's Safety Plan Preferred Treatment Provider Status – Heidi Nunnemacher, PsyD, TreeTop Counseling and Wellness, LLC

Heidi Nunnemacher, PsyD, shared her professional background and the services currently provided by TreeTop Counseling and Wellness, LLC. Nunnemacher has worked as an independent practice under Cornerstone Counseling where her services included driver safety plans, depression/anxiety, stress/anger management and dual diagnosis. TreeTop collaborates with providers in the community to ensure clients receive the care they need and offers both telehealth and in-person appointments. The clinic also promotes medication assisted treatment (MAT) and will help clients find providers that offer MAT. TreeTop accepts United Health Care (UHC/UBH/UMR), Medicaid and Medicare and, also offers a sliding fee scale. TreeTop is not licensed by the state but does have a consulting mechanism in place for supervision.

The committee thanked Nunnemacher for her presentation. Nunnemacher left the meeting and discussion was then held by the committee on the application and presentation of TreeTop Counseling and Wellness, LLC

Andrews moved, second by Menefee to approve Heidi Nunnemacher, PsyD, TreeTop Counseling and Wellness, LLC as a driver's safety plan preferred treatment provider. Motion carried.

Reports

- Acknowledgement and thanks to Arlene White for her service to the IPID Committee. In her place, the committee welcomes Daniel Michaels.
- HHS will be releasing \$200,000 toward substance use prevention. Funds will be released to schools and prevention agencies to increase substance use prevention within the county.
- Shout-out to the Addiction Resource Council (ARC) for their continued prevention work in the community.
- DHS-75 rewrite continues to be reviewed by HHS. More information to follow.
- The National Prescription Drug and Heroin Summit was held in April. Fentanyl continues to be the driver in opiate use and overdose across the country. Other drugs such as cocaine and methamphetamines are being laced with Fentanyl and "fake" drugs are being produced with an increased prevalence. Online "fake" pharmacies are also being opened which can present a significant danger to the senior community, who may be looking for cheaper medications.

- DHS released a memo regarding driver's safety plans stating that the designated assessment agency should
 request that the treatment provider do an assessment for MAT if there is suspected dependency, dependency,
 or dependency in remission for opioids/alcohol. There will be a box on the assessment to indicate this to the
 treatment provider. Ultimately, it is up to the client to decide if they want to receive MAT. If they choose not to
 receive recommended MAT, they will not be held in non-compliance for their decision.
- HHS Board reviewed each committee's needs assessments at the last meeting. County Executive Paul Farrow
 was in attendance.
- HHS has applied for a crisis stabilization grant. This will help improve mobile crisis services and create an
 expansion on-site.
- HHS is fully staffed with clinical therapists. There will be several new prescribers starting soon as well.
- Public Health has just completed their community health assessment data, which takes place every 5 years. It
 appears likely that opioids/substance use in the community will be one of the main topics to be addressed over
 the next 5 years.
