Highlight: Community Development

UW-Extension Community Development Educators collaborate with communities, non-profit organizations and residents to address local issues. Educators combine skills and expertise with local knowledge and university research to strengthen communities through educational programs and services addressing leadership development, community and economic development, and organizational development.

Strategic planning is an area where educators offer workshops and direct assistance to communities and organizations. This process is “a disciplined effort to produce fundamental decisions and actions that shape and guide what an organization is, what it does, and why it does it,” as defined by John Bryson, professor of planning and public affairs at the University of Minnesota.



The UW-Extension led neighborhood community garden provides opportunities for residents to meet and work together to address neighborhood concerns.

In 2017, Waukesha County UW-Extension provided a strategic planning overview workshop for non-profit organizations, which helped participants determine if their organization was ready for strategic planning, understand different methods for gathering data, identify strategic issues and organize for successful implementation. Educators also assisted the New Berlin Chamber of Commerce, the Village of Mukwonago, and the City of West Allis work through their strategic planning process to develop a multi-year plan.

Food Safety Modernization Act Training Offered for Agricultural Producers

Waukesha County Commercial Horticulture Educator, Kristin Krokowski, will work with other agencies to hold Produce Safety Alliance trainings to educate produce farmers on how to comply with the Food Safety Modernization Act (FSMA), the most sweeping reform of our food safety laws in 70 years. By completing the training, produce farmers will receive a federally recognized certification for their farm, which is a requirement for all growers who fall under the FSMA rule.



Trainings will be held January 21st as part of the 2018 Wisconsin Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Growers Conference in Wisconsin Dells, February 26th hosted by Fond du Lac County UW-Extension, and March 2nd for Organic Valley growers in Cashton. An additional class, focusing on improving food safety at farmers' markets, will be held on March 16th in Black River Falls.

USDA Rural Development Grant Supports Small Businesses

Waukesha County UW-Extension is providing educational outreach to the Village of Palmyra to address critical issues and technical needs of small businesses. This business enterprise project works directly with business and Village leaders to identify small business needs and develop educational workshops that address these needs. In addition, UW-Extension will connect these small businesses with technical resources in the area.

This project is funded by a USDA Rural Development Grant which is being offered simultaneously with the Village of Eagle River and the Town of Phelps, in cooperation with UW-Extension educators in Vilas County. Throughout the process, these three communities will learn from one another utilizing distance learning technologies.

4-H Photography Meetings Begin January 24

Volunteer led monthly 4-H photography project meetings will begin on January 24th, where youth will learn and improve photography skills. Meetings will include learning camera settings, different lighting and background effects, and photo cropping.

4-H enrollment is required to participate in the 4-H Photography project, Waukesha County's largest 4-H interest area for more than 10 years.
