MULTI-YEAR SCHEDULE OF PREPAREDNESS ACTIVITIES

Integrated Preparedness Schedule 2026 - 2028

PURPOSE

The Waukesha County Integrated Preparedness Plan (IPP) contains preparedness priorities, outlining steps designed to build and sustain capabilities while tailoring them to our community's unique needs. The plan provides our community with direction, accountability, and coordination. The plan's priorities encompass goals and objectives that rest primarily with municipal and county partners including collaborative steps that recognize the shared responsibility to prepare, protect, support, and assist local governments, and the whole community.

Waukesha County Emergency Management administers the IPP in cooperation with its municipal partners. All Waukesha County and corresponding jurisdiction government offices follow the IPP. The plan describes Waukesha County's threats, hazards, and risks along with other internal and external factors which influence the preparedness priorities for years 2026-2028. The preparedness priorities, corresponding capabilities, and rationale are included in the IPP with multi-year calendars outlining all preparedness activities.

The Waukesha County IPP is designed to be a living document that will be updated and refined annually or as needed to inform the continuous improvement of our community's ability to build, sustain, and deliver preparedness capabilities.

PREPAREDNESS ACTIVITY CONSIDERATIONS

The Waukesha County Integrated Preparedness Plan (IPP) is a foundational document to guide successful preparedness activities related to Waukesha County and its municipalities' capabilities for responding to, recovering from, and mitigating the effects of the threats, hazards, and risks deemed the most applicable to the area. The IPP establishes priorities and goals that will guide county efforts to build, improve, and sustain capabilities across the five emergency management mission areas of prevention, protection, mitigation, response and recovery.

METHODOLOGY

To develop this plan, Waukesha County Emergency Management distributed surveys to gather information from both the general public and various stakeholders. Stakeholders included Senior Leaders and others amongst public and private organizations, educational institutions, local government units, non-governmental organizations, police and fire departments, local emergency managers, and critical infrastructure within Waukesha County.

The survey aimed to collect feedback on the previous year's Integrated Preparedness Plan and identify current capability gaps related to hazards threatening our community. The general public consisted of individuals living or working in Waukesha County. The survey focused on participants' lived experiences and perceptions of disasters from the past ten years. It also examined the personal impacts of these events and identified the hazards that participants felt least prepared for.

A total of 60 responses were received, with representation from the following stakeholders:

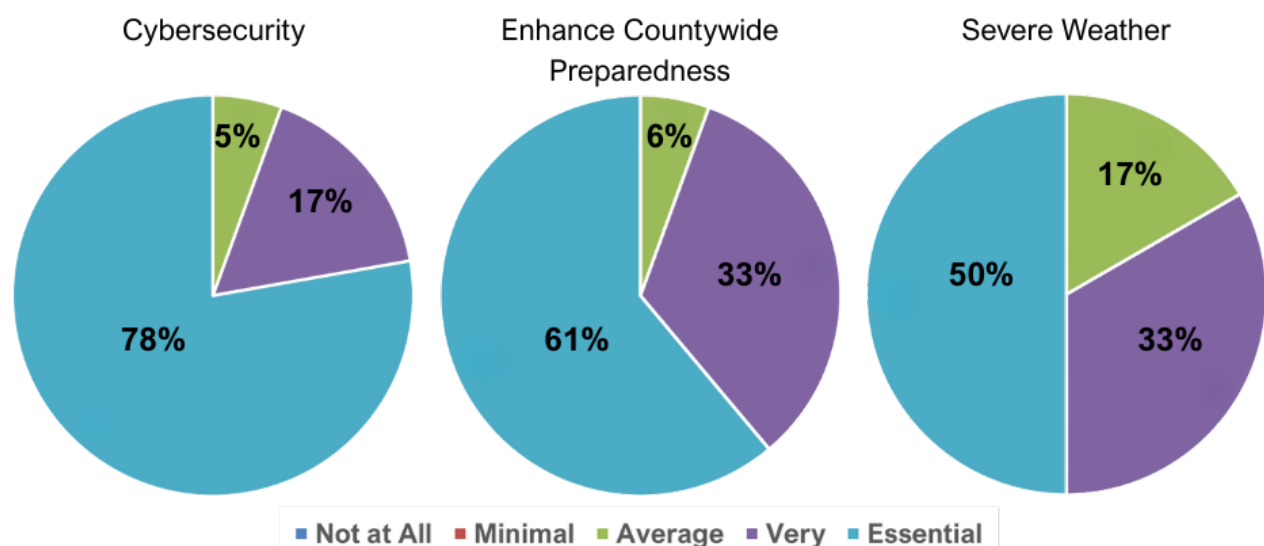
Threats, Hazards, and Risks

During the development of the 2021 Waukesha County Hazard Mitigation Plan, local municipalities contributed to identifying hazards that could affect communities throughout Waukesha County. The identified hazards are included in the table below. The Planning Team considered the hazards highlighted in the 2021 Waukesha County Hazard Mitigation Plan while developing public and stakeholder surveys and this plan. 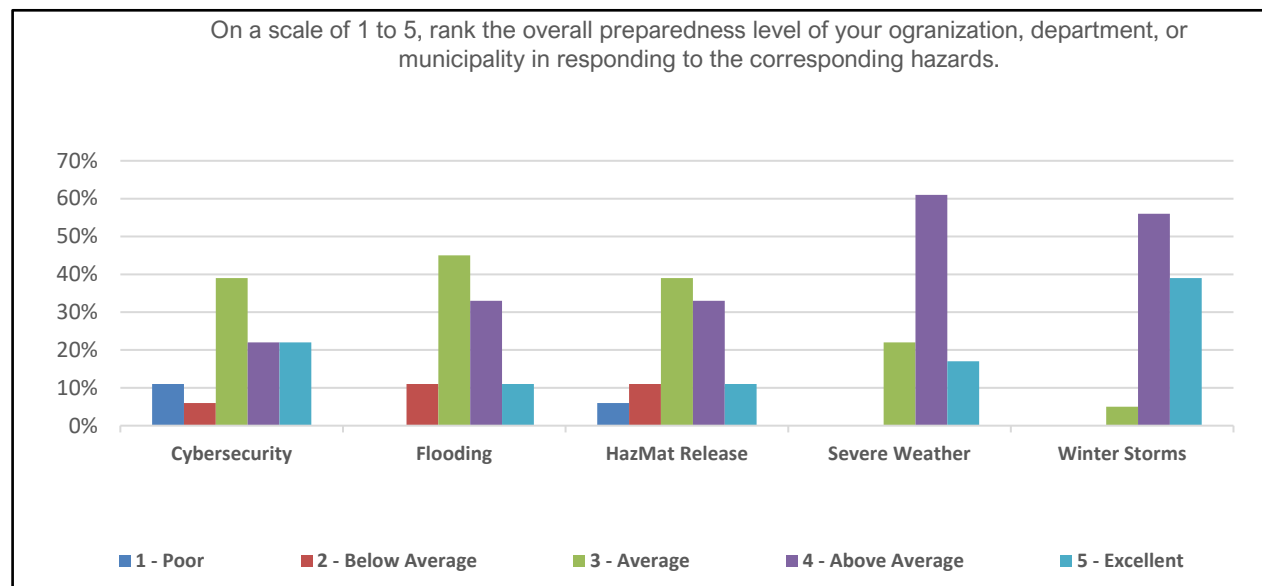
Survey Data Analysis

Survey respondents provided input as to the level of importance for maintaining the previous year's IPP priorities. When prompted, respondents ranked the following priorities: Enhance Countywide Preparedness (94%), Cybersecurity (95%), and Severe Weather (83%) as 'Very Important' or 'Essential' in terms of the importance of continuing these priorities in the plan's



next cycle. Additionally, responses assisted the Planning Team in identifying hazards based on what stakeholders felt the County was least prepared for and/or identifying capability gaps.

The top three hazards identified were *cybersecurity*, *hazardous materials release*, and *flooding*.



The Planning Team reviewed the identified hazards in conjunction with the priorities that survey respondents identified as essential to carry forward in the next iteration of this plan. Due to similarities in cascading impacts, response and recovery procedures, and required resources, the Planning Team chose to combine Flooding and Severe Weather.

Respondents reporting that they felt their organization, department, or municipality's overall preparedness level to respond to a given hazard was below 'Excellent', were required to provide additional input as to what contributing factors led to their decision. Respondents were required to rank their level of agreement with statements spanning the POETE (Planning, Organizing, Equipping, Training, Exercising) Model.

Overall, responses indicated capability gaps in response to specific hazards as a result of:

- Lack of involvement from relevant departments/stakeholders in the process of reviewing and/or updating plans.
- Lack of resources (personnel, equipment, finances) to adequately handle large-scale emergencies.
- Inconsistent training on emergency response procedures for personnel and/or new employees.
- Lack of regularly conducted exercises to provide a comprehensive test of plans, procedures, and response capabilities.

IMPLEMENTATION

The Waukesha County Office of Emergency Management will work throughout the scheduled period to address the proposed preparedness priorities according to the plan's timeline. The Planning Team assigned desired outcomes or goals for each preparedness priority, incorporating objectives spanning the POETE (Plan, Organize, Equip, Train, Exercise) Model to maintain capabilities and/or address gaps. The development of the desired outcomes and corresponding objectives was the direct result of survey data collected by the Planning Team.

The schedule of preparedness priority objectives spans this plan's 3-year cycle, detailed in the [MULTI-YEAR SCHEDULE OF PREPAREDNESS ACTIVITIES](#). Regarding the fulfillment or completion of preparedness priority objectives, Waukesha County Office of Emergency Management will:

Plan

Coordinate the development and update of County plans related to emergency management, and/or templates, guides, and aids for stakeholder use.

Organize

Research, develop, and/or promote emergency management best practices, and coordinate the development and maintenance of organizational groups, relationships, and structures that enable the preparedness capabilities within this plan.

Equip

Seek, apply for, and share situational awareness on funding opportunities and/or develop, promote Memorandums of Understanding (MOUs)/Memorandums of Agreement (MOAs) to supplement County and municipal equipment needs.

Train

Identify, coordinate, participate in, deliver, and/or support the delivery of applicable training that enables the preparedness capabilities.

Exercise

Coordinate, develop, request, and facilitate a range of exercises (workshop, game, tabletop, functional, and full-scale) to test and validate applicable emergency management plans for the county and stakeholders.

Priority 1 - Cybersecurity

Increase awareness and improve incident response procedures to reduce service impact and expedite recovery efforts.

Corresponding Capabilities

- Cybersecurity
- Operational Communications

Rationale

Cyberattacks are a growing, ever-present threat that can compromise critical services and infrastructure. Survey responses indicated gaps in equipment, infrastructure, alternate systems, and adequately trained staff, indicating potential cyber-incident response impediments. Improvements to corresponding capabilities can be made through planning efforts focused on response and recovery functions, as well as the acquisition of necessary equipment and training.

Priority 2 - Enhance Countywide Preparedness

Enhance response capabilities at the county and municipal levels through various preparedness activities.

Corresponding Capabilities

- Operational Coordination
- Planning

Rationale

Given Waukesha County Emergency Management's limited capacity to fully support multiple municipalities during a widespread incident, enhancing county and municipal emergency management programs is essential. Enhancing countywide preparedness promotes resilience and strengthens emergency management programs, increasing the ability to manage disasters effectively. Survey results and After-Action Reports/Improvement Plans identified the need to address gaps in fully trained personnel, plan development and update, and readily available training to test stakeholders' plans and procedures.

Priority 3 - Hazardous Materials

Maintain and improve plans and response capabilities regarding hazardous materials releases.

Corresponding Capabilities

- Environmental Response/Health & Safety
- Planning

Rationale

Hazardous materials releases remain a potential threat in Waukesha County. Maintaining and improving plans and response capabilities for hazardous materials release assists response agencies in effectively responding to and mitigating potential cascading effects. Survey respondents identified staffing, equipment, and training gaps in relation to responding effectively.

Priority 4 - Severe Weather

Improve capabilities in responding to and recovering from severe weather incidents.

Corresponding Capabilities

- Planning
- Operational Coordination

Rationale

Dependent on severity, severe weather incidents can quickly overwhelm a local municipality's ability to respond and recover. After-Action Reports/Improvement Plans, lessons learned from real-world incidents, and survey data indicate gaps in staffing, trained personnel, and resources to support response and recovery operations adequately. Updating and testing plans and procedures, acquiring training, and seeking alternative means to supplement or replace equipment/resource needs will be required to improve response and recovery capabilities.

PROGRAM MAINTENANCE

While continuously monitoring improvement actions, the Waukesha County Office of Emergency Management will periodically examine capabilities to ensure they are sufficient, accurate, and effective in addressing the threats, hazards, and risks facing the county and to inform future Integrated Preparedness Cycle activities.

Jurisdictions in Waukesha County are encouraged to consider this plan for their preparedness program and reporting efforts.

Waukesha County Emergency Management will compile and document areas for improvement, lessons learned, and potential best practices identified from exercises and real-world incidents.

Annually, the Integrated Preparedness Team will identify which actions are needed to address areas for improvement using the following questions:

- What changes should be made to plans and procedures?
- Are there recommendations for required changes to organizational structures?
- Should any changes to equipment or resources occur?
- What training can be leveraged to increase knowledge?
- What exercises will best validate preparedness or reveal opportunities for improvement?

All actions should align with capabilities to allow measurement of the effect on the corresponding capabilities. When deemed necessary, corrective actions should be prioritized and directed to a single stakeholder, if possible. Corrective actions should be documented and reported in an annual summary report.

This plan will be updated annually or as needed, based on the above as well as exercise or incident outcomes as appropriate.
