FOOD TRUCK GENERATOR SAFETY

Prevent poisoning and injury with these simple steps



Portable generators are used to power many of the appliances in food trucks when a direct source of electrical power is not available. These generators run on gasoline.



PREVENT CARBON MONOXIDE POISONING

- Generators create carbon monoxide in their exhaust.
- Carbon monoxide cannot be seen or smelled, but it can sicken or even kill you.
- Never use the generator <u>inside</u> a food truck or any enclosed area.
- Always run generators as far away from the food truck as possible. Ideally, the
 generator should be 20 feet from a food tuck or anywhere people are gathering.
- Always aim the exhaust <u>away</u> from people and structures.
- Install a carbon monoxide detector in your food truck to keep you safe.



PREVENT ELECTRICAL PROBLEMS

- Never plug the generator into a wall outlet unless an electrician has installed a transfer switch.
- **Keep the generator dry.** Dry your hands before using a generator.
- Use the correct extension cord. The cord should be heavy-duty and designed for outdoor use. It should be grounded (3-pronged) and have a rating that exceeds the wattage of all devices in use.
- Make sure all electrical cords are in good condition, not frayed or crimped.



PREVENT FIRES

- Never store generator fuel near an ignition source.
- Before refueling a generator, turn it off and let it cool down.
- Always follow manufacturer instructions.
