MINUTES**

**INTERESTED PARTIES:**

The meeting was called to order at 10:33 a.m. by Chair Barton. Introductions amongst the group were exchanged.

**APPROVAL OF MINUTES**

Motion was made by Dennis Williams, second by Dennis Radloff to approve the minutes of October 20, 2015 with noted correction to remove the name of Brad Pitt.

**PRESENTATION**

Rebecca Scott is the Case Manager for 180° Juvenile Diversion Program. The 180° Juvenile Diversion Program is a non-profit entity that partners with the District Attorney's office. The program is a nine month commitment that offers a second chance to young adults who have committed a first time misdemeanor or low-level felony. If a client takes the deal to complete the program, the District Attorney's office will give a reduction or dismissal of that person's charges.

There are two phases to the 180° Juvenile Diversion Program. Phase I is three months of classes held two evenings a week. Clients will complete 72 hours of an evidence-driven, life skills curriculum. Phase II is six months of case management. Clients meet on a bi-monthly basis with the case manager to discuss individualized action plans developed in Phase I. Additional program requirements will be followed up on to ensure clients are on track for successful graduation of the program. Case management provides accountability on academics, counseling/treatment referrals, family monitoring, and assistance. In order to pass the 180° Juvenile Diversion Program, clients create a life map that encompasses eight major life areas of where they want to be in 1-20 years going forward.

The 180° Juvenile Diversion Program has served approximately 400 clients and has been in existence for six years. Statistics have shown that 89% of graduates in the program are successful, and 12% go back to reoffend. Scott shared a fact sheet and informational packet on the 180° Juvenile Diversion Program. A question and answer period followed.

## **PRESENTATION**

Jonathan Fazekas is the Director of Operations at the Healing Corner. The Healing Corner is a substance use clinic that began in 2007. Services include suboxone and Vivitrol treatment, AODA counseling, outpatient services, and Intensive Outpatient Programs. The Healing Corner is the #1 leading provider offering Vivitrol in the Midwest as an individual provider, and top substance clinic.

The clinic owns and analyzes each client's drug test. Drug testing on a client is performed daily with supervised drug screening. Testing is uniquely performed on a ten panel and includes testing for a heroin and alcohol metabolite. The Healing Corner has established partnerships with Assurance Labs, S.A.L.S. House, Department of Corrections, and Dewey. Changes to the way intensive outpatient is taught includes guest speakers, movies, and team building activities. A question and answer period followed.

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## **NOMINATIONS: COMMITTEE CHAIR AND VICE-CHAIR**

MOTION: Dennis Williams renominated Rose Barton to continue roll as Chair, second by Dennis Radloff. Dennis Williams renominated Lou Hernandez to continue role as Vice-Chair, second by Dennis Radloff for another term. All vote. Motion approved.

## **NOMINATIONS: COMMITTEE MEMBERS**

MOTION: Dennis Williams moved to nominate the 180° Juvenile Diversion Program as a new agency seat to the Committee, second by Dennis Radloff. Kevin Schaefer moved to nominate the Healing Corner as a new agency seat to the Committee, second by Dennis Radloff. All vote. Motion approved.

## **HHS BOARD LIAISON REPORT**

O'Brien reported on the Health and Human Services Board meeting of November 12, 2015. Two public health nurses reported about two vehicles of smoking by pregnant women. The mortality rate for infants whose mother's smoke is significantly higher than infants of non-smoking mothers.

## **HHS STAFF LIAISON REPORT**

Kettler reported a new group for adolescents for substance use treatment began in the Clinical Services Outpatient Clinic. The group is an early intervention type of treatment facilitated by Kris Daul, a dually certified counselor, once a week for 8 weeks.

The Treatment pillar of the Heroin Task Force has scheduled a provider meeting to collaborate and discuss best practices. The meeting is confirmed for Thursday, January 14, 2016 and over thirty providers will be present.
