WAUKESHA COUNTY TO HOLD PRESCRIPTION DRUG COLLECTION THIS SATURDAY

WAUKESHA, Wis. –Waukesha County will be holding a prescription drug collection this Saturday, April 27, 2013 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. The collection, which is the fifth for the Waukesha County Drug Free Communities (DFC) Coalition, is an effort to prevent prescription drug abuse and accidental poisonings in Waukesha County as well as help protect local waterways.

In recent years, Waukesha County’s Metro Drug Unit has seen an increase in the number of teenagers abusing prescribed pharmaceuticals.

“In this day and age, teenagers are not afraid to take pills and can quickly become addicted,” said Captain Frank McElderry, Commander of the Waukesha County Metro Drug Unit. “Many teenagers believe prescription pain relievers, even if not prescribed by a doctor, are not addictive.”

The misuse and abuse of prescription medication has acted as a “spring board” for other illicit drugs such as Heroin, McElderry said.

“Educating the teenagers and their parents is very important,” McElderry said. “Unfortunately, most parents are either unaware or in denial about their teenager’s vulnerability and exposure to the intentional abuse of prescribed medicines. The prescription drug collection program is an important and proactive step to prevent future abuse.”

Seven sites countywide have been designated for the collection on Saturday,

Brookfield: Brookfield Recycling Center

Menomonee Falls: Community Memorial Hospital

Mukwonago: D.N. Greenwald Center, 240 West Maple Avenue

Muskego: Muskego Police Department

Oconomowoc: Oconomowoc Memorial Hospital

Pewaukee: WCTC

Waukesha: Waukesha State Bank, Downtown Branch

Residents are encouraged to bring their unwanted and unused medications, in their original containers, to any one of the seven locations on Saturday. Prescription medications, over the counter medications, ointments, sprays, inhalers, creams, vials, herbals and pet medications will all be accepted by pharmacists on the day of the event. Residents are asked not to bring biohazardous material, sharps, mercury, personal hygiene products and household hazardous waste.

The program is free-of-charge due to a partnership with the Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA), ProHealth Care and donations from community organizations, businesses and individuals.
