INTERESTED PARTIES:

The meeting was called to order at 10:32 a.m. by Chair Barton. Introductions amongst the group were exchanged.

PRESENTATION: Update on SCAODA Intervention and Treatment Committee

Badura and Muchka attended the Wisconsin State Council on Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse (SCAODA) meeting on March 4, 2016 and were able to speak about the need for additional treatment and aftercare centers to the legislators and senators present. Badura shared a handout about Wisconsin's FY2016 Substance Abuse Service Expansion Awards. The centers to receive an award amount include Milwaukee 16th Street Community Health Center, Marshfield Family Health Center, Iron River the Lakes Community Health Center, Madison Community Health Center, and Milwaukee Outreach Community Health Centers. Additional information on the Wisconsin Hope Legislation was shared. Assembly Bills 364, 365, and 366 will be signed by the Governor on March 17, 2016.

REHEARSAL OF UNMET NEEDS PRESENTATION

Barton reported on March 24, 2016, members of the AODA Advisory committee will present the Unmet Needs for 2017 to the Health and Human Services Board. A meeting of all advisory committee chairs is being held on March 16, 2016. Joint recommendations will be co-presented with the Mental Health Advisory Committee to include resources for helping people evaluate benefits and making important changes, navigating benefit specialist specific to needs of the mental health and substance abuse recovery, mental health and aging issues, and the need for more intensive community supports with psychiatrists with an addictions background. Barton reviewed a draft list of the AODA Committees identified unmet needs. The Committee members reviewed and discussed each bulleted item. Additional wording to add to bullet one is to advocate that opiate detox resources be part of recovery oriented system of care. Bullet two comment to change range of median age for opioid overdoses. The committee supports agencies that are trying to develop programs in Waukesha County. Bullet three be separated into two different points: a) for support of narcan training for law enforcement, b) vivitrol as medication for assisted treatment for those newly released from incarceration. Bullet four change to a 2% cost of living increase for all contracted facilities and programs.

DISCUSS 2016 EDUCATIONAL SEGMENTS

Upcoming topics recommended include

- Pilot program by the Greenfield police department. This program provides an option of treatment rather than arrest for possession of drugs. Money collected from fines is being channeled into providing treatment. The Greenfield police department program was featured on the local news.
- EMS firefighters
- CJCC EBDM
- Waukesha Comprehensive Treatment Center
- Community Health Center Waukesha
- Methadone Clinic
- Dr. Miller from Rogers Memorial Hospital report on medications. Invite a physician from Waukesha Memorial Hospital speak on how they address when people are presented in the ER.
- DOJ did presentation of the Dose of Reality videos. Powerful videos. Consider showing materials from the DOJ website, posters, and videos.
- Future presentation from the 3 C's, Choices, Chances, and Changes. Badura shared a brochure. The 3 C's are connected with St. Vincent de Paul.

AGENCY/MEMBER UPDATES

Adamus provided an update on the co-ed facility expansion of Genesis house to a 20 bed facility. To date, Lutheran Social Services is looking at the Northview building that was a school, and working with the owner of the building to assist with repair costs to the facility. This location is located within the city of Waukesha.

Reilly reported on the Narcan training, every 3rd Tuesday at the Healing Corner in Brookfield. Last month, twelve people were in attendance and many were from the Waukesha community. Another training is scheduled for this evening at the Healing Corner, 7:00 p.m. in Brookfield.

LaMack shared pocket size meeting schedules for the Alano Club of Waukesha.

Mary Jane Orth-Fenning, a community member introduced herself. Orth-Fenning is a member of Alanon and shared flyers about a new open meeting held each Monday for anyone to attend.

HHS BOARD LIAISON REPORT

HHS STAFF LIAISON REPORT

Kettler reported the mental health outpatient clinic acquired an internal position to assist with crisis services coverage. Additionally, Kettler thanked the AODA Volunteers of Waukesha County for their work with the new set of groups for the Alcohol & Drug Treatment Court participants. The annual Health and Human Services Public Hearing will be on April 7, 2016 at 7:00 p.m.

Sternweis reported the Criminal Justice Collaborating Council continues their work in the Evidence Based Decision Making (EBDM) model. A future update on the CJCC EBDM model will be scheduled.

The Housing Action Coalition is making a transition on March 31, 2016 from a local coalition managed group. On April 1, 2016 a formal transition to a full board of directors will take place. Individuals are appointed by the Waukesha County Executive representing all sectors of the county. Congratulations to John Kettler, HHS representative on the Waukesha Housing Action Coalition Board of Directors.
